The SEASON OF LENT is the period of forty days (excluding Sundays) leading up to Easter. It is traditionally a time of self-examination and repentance through prayer, fasting, self-denial, and reading and meditating on scripture. Lent concludes with the Easter Vigil Service on the night before Easter Day. The forty days of Lent symbolizes the forty years in which the Israelites wandered in the wilderness in search of the Promised Land. It also recalls the time Jesus spent in the wilderness in fasting and prayer, during which he was tempted. A common practice during Lent is to participate in a Lenten discipline; this can involve giving something up or taking on a new practice, in order to deepen your faith and bring you closer to Christ. We hope you will join us as the community of St. George's journeys together into the Lenten season.




LITANY OF PENITENCE

All	Most holy and merciful Father: We confess to you and to one another, and to the whole communion of saints in heaven and on earth, that we have sinned by our own fault in thought, word, and deed; by what we have done, and by what we have left undone.
Officiant	We have not loved you with our whole heart, and mind, and strength. We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We have not forgiven others, as we have been forgiven.
People	Have mercy on us, Lord.
Officiant	We have been deaf to your call to serve, as Christ served us. We have not been true to the mind of Christ. We have grieved your Holy Spirit.
People	Have mercy on us, Lord.
Officiant	We confess to you, Lord, all our past unfaithfulness: the pride, hypocrisy, and impatience of our lives,
People	We confess to you, Lord.
Officiant People	Our self-indulgent appetites and ways, and our exploitation of other people, We confess to you, Lord.
Officiant People	Our anger at our own frustration, and our envy of those more fortunate than ourselves, We confess to you, Lord.
Officiant	Our intemperate love of worldly goods and comforts, and our dishonesty in daily life and work,
People	We confess to you, Lord.
Officiant People	Our negligence in prayer and worship, and our failure to commend the faith that is in us, We confess to you, Lord.
Officiant	Accept our repentance, Lord, for the wrongs we have done: for our blindness to human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty,
People	Accept our repentance, Lord.
Officiant	For all false judgments, for uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbors, and for our prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us,
People	Accept our repentance, Lord.
Officiant	For our waste and pollution of your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us,
People	Accept our repentance, Lord.
Officiant People	Restore us, good Lord, and let your anger depart from us; Favorably hear us, for your mercy is great.
Officiant People	Accomplish in us the work of your salvation, That we may show forth your glory in the world.
Officiant People	By the cross and passion of your Son our Lord, Bring us with all your saints to the joy of his resurrection.

Officiant Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who desires not the death of sinners, but rather that they may turn from their wickedness and live, has given power and commandment to his ministers to declare and pronounce to his people, being penitent, the absolution and remission of their sins. And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you – not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.



- ALTAR FLOWER/CANDLE DONATIONS Although altar flowers are not used during the season of Lent, we will once again be using altar candles now that we're streaming services from the church. If you would like to donate funds for the altar candles in February or March (or the months thereafter), please visit the <u>Online Flower/Candle Donation Calendar</u> and enter your name and, if you wish, your dedication, next to the week or month of your choice. The calendar is also open for flower donations for the Sundays after Easter. Donations and dedications for Easter lilies will be gathered separately from the online flower calendar and will be announced soon.
- FORWARD DAY BY DAY Although we can't put them out in the church entrances right now, we are still getting the Forward Day by Day booklet of meditations. A couple of parishioners have volunteered to deliver them to anyone who would like one, while supplies last. - CHRISTOPHER HOUSE BASKETS St. George's has a long-standing ministry of delivering hospitality baskets to the families of patients at Christopher House.
