Interim Rector's Corner

Dear St. George's Family:

Happy New Year as we enter this first season of the Church calendar, Advent! Advent is considered, to varying degrees, a penitential season, as preparation for the celebration of the birth of Christ at Christmas. Church linens and vestments were typically purple, as in our long penitential season of Lent before Easter. However, the more

contemporary commemoration of Advent has been with the color blue. Floral arrangements are exchanged for evergreen wreathes and/or poinsettias. Wreaths of pine offer a symbolism as they stand for the circle and eternal regard for life. Holly used during Advent is symbolic of the crown of thorns. Poinsettias used during Advent are seen as an offering of welcome and a symbol of how we regard one another.

How we regard one another is a "way of life" we might each consider and pray about as we enter into Advent and all the craziness of commercial "Christmas." Continuing to come out more and more into the world after the isolation of the pandemic, let us not forget the cost that was taken around the world to reach this point. As we prepare for the coming of Christ during Advent, we continue to pay the cost of all the ways the pandemic has changed our lives, but we cannot let that stop us from looking for Christ in all around us and in all the people we encounter in our day to day lives.

How we regard one another... sadly, we will be saying good-bye to Jennifer this week. She has served St. George's well for six years, years that came with all kinds of challenges: rector leaving, interim priest, interim rector, COVID, break-ins... and life goes on! We wish her all the best with this new position as Director of Operations at St. Mark's. A blessed Advent and Christmas to Jennifer and her family. Most of all, a grateful "thank you and well done" from all of us!

Search Committee Update

Hello St George's family! As a part of the search process,
I'll be sharing monthly information on our process for
calling "Rector Next," as I've started to referring to our future partner in ministry.

One of the search committee's first tasks was developing a wide range of questions to be used in our upcoming interviews using the STAR Method (STAR is an abbreviation for Situation/Task, Action, Result.)

The STAR method of interviewing helps us focus on the specific criteria for a rector. In addition, it provides a method

whereby the committee members can hone their ability to interview and gain relevant and extremely important information which can ultimately inform our evaluation of the candidates.

With or collection of STAR questions tailored to St George's, we'll be able to maximize the time we have with candidates. Additionally, the STAR method gives a structure where rector candidates can share what actions in their past ministry did (and sometimes didn't) have the desired results.

Here are a couple examples of STAR questions from our last working meeting:

- 1. Our location in a growing city garners us a fair number of visitors looking for a church home. What steps do you routinely take to gain the trust/commitment of new prospects who are considering joining the congregation? What were the results?
- 2. Recall a task you have delegated to a committee or lay leader at your church. What accountability procedure did you require of that committee/person? Describe how this committee/person has responded.

Now for my recruiting plug – the diocese welcomes nominations from parishioners. If you know of priests you think would be a good candidate, names can be sent directly to our Transition Minister, the Rev. Kellaura Johnson at **kjohnson@epicenter.org**. The diocese has a process to keep all nominations strictly confidential. Also, even if your candidate isn't available, they may know someone who'd be a perfect fit for St George's!

Please keep in mind that the search committee can discuss our *process* for making a call, but we are strictly limited on how much we can discuss about our *progress* through that process. In this era of immediate connections, information that seems incidental has the potential to sink a nomination and set us back months.

Finally, please keep our candidates and the search committee in your prayers. As much as this resembles a corporate hiring process, we're here for the Holy Spirit to work through us and our future rector.

The Season of Advent

The first Sunday of Advent, which falls on November 28th this year, begins the Church's liturgical year. Advent begins four Sundays before Christmas and lasts until Christmas Eve. It is a time of reflection, waiting and preparation for the birth of Jesus Christ. The season's name is derived from the Latin word *adventus*, which means "coming" or "arrival." Advent is a time of

preparation and expectation for the coming celebration of our Lord's nativity, and for the final coming of Christ. The Scripture readings throughout the season reflect this double anticipation of the coming of Christ – his First Advent as a babe in Bethlehem, and his Second Advent in power and glory. Advent is a reminder that we live between the times, when what has been promised has not yet been fulfilled. Advent is also an invitation into a space of prayerful expectation that is often at odds with the larger culture's approach to the weeks before Christmas.


The most common symbol of Advent is the Advent Wreath – a circle of greenery with four (or five) candles, each of which represents one of the Sundays of the season. (If a fifth candle is used, it is placed in the center and called the Christ Candle, and it is lit on Christmas Eve.) Each Sunday, the circle of light expands, as Christ comes ever closer.

Our poinsettias this year will come from **Down Home Ranch**, a non-profit farming community in Elgin that works to empower the lives of people with intellectual and developmental disabilities through social, educational, residential and vocational opportunities.

In-Person Worship

Our Sunday morning services continue to grow as we enjoy gathering in-person and re-connecting with our community as we emerge from the pandemic. We hope that you can join us! We are continuing to take measures to be safe, and our policies evolve as the situation changes. Masks and social distancing are required; we are remaining in our pews to receive communion; and in-person worshipers are asked not to sing until the final hymn.

The 10:30 service continues to be accessible via both Zoom

and Facebook Live, so if you don't feel safe coming back to in-person church just yet or can't make it every Sunday, you can still worship with us!

Nineteen Steps to Calling a New Rector

Just as there are 19 steps in the Wright House up to the Rector's Office, there are 19 steps for the congregation going through the process of preparing for and calling a new rector. The whole congregation is invited to be part of the process of each of these 19 steps, the ultimate goal being the arrival of a newly called rector on Step 19! The steps are:

- ✓ 1. The Rector announces that s/he is leaving.
- Supply clergy lead worship; work out interim priest arrangement.
- ✓ 3. The Interim priest arrives; work out Interim Rector arrangement.
- 4. The Interim Rector arrives and begins transition work.
- \checkmark 5. The congregation completes a survey provided by the diocese.
- \checkmark 6. The results of the survey are shared with the congregation.
- 7. The Parish Profile Committee is formed and generates a Parish Profile.
- 8. When the profile is ready, the diocese approves it.
- 9. The Profile is circulated locally and nationally for six to eight weeks.
- ✓ 10. The Search Committee is formed and prepares for interviews.
- 11. The Search Committee reviews applications and holds interviews.
- 12. Zoom visits or (if safe and possible) in-person visits are held with the candidates.
- 13. The Search Committee narrows the list to one or two finalists and presents them to the Vestry.
- 14. Throughout the work of the Parish Profile and Search Committees, transition and interim work are taking place.
- 15. The Vestry reviews the name(s) from the Search Committee.
- 16. The Vestry votes to extend a call to one candidate.
- 17. A call goes out to the new Rector.
- 18. A Transition Team is formed to welcome the new Rector and his/her family.
-] 19. The new Rector arrives.
