Interim Priest's Corner

Dear St. George's Family:

Greetings,

I wanted to share the "February" page of the Church Pension Group which has classic illustrations that are so 'spot on.' This month it has our Presiding Bishop Michael Curry at a pulpit with a big heart banner hanging on the front. With a big grin he proclaims, "Since February is Heart Awareness Month allow me to report...." The next panel on the page he offers, "if it's not about love, it's not about God."

Coming out of the 2022 annual meeting there are several examples that propel this congregation into ministries and mindfulness. It is clear God's love is in the lives of this worshipping community. As we all are aware, God's love is not necessarily always defined as "sunshine and lollipops." However, the pain of the eight-plus break-ins has revealed serious damage that would not have been discovered had we not been pulling out broken stained glass and frameworks. Yes, we have major construction work happening on the church and Wright House; but, left unattended, the situation might have been much more serious if let go as it was before we started opening walls. And so we humbly move forward! I offer the following prayer,

"Loving God, we come as your beloved children,

presenting the needs and concerns of our hearts.

Listen to our prayers, and lead us in your pathways,

for we come to you through Christ our Lord."

We offer to God what is in our hearts; we ask for our prayers to be heard, and for direction on which way to go. There is so much happening right now at St. George's: a time of transition; a search committee diligently doing their work which will lead to calling a new rector; resolving grounds and building issues; and a pandemic that continues to morph into new variations and trigger new sets of "rules" in which to act. This can all be very consuming of our time, our energy, and our hearts. Yet it is in our hearts that we find God in the midst of all of this happening!

The calendar page also reminds us that we are part of a bigger entity, The Episcopal Church, a church with 110 dioceses in this country, a province that is part of the worldwide Anglican Communion. As our Presiding Bishop has reminded us over and over: "We are the Episcopal Branch of the Jesus Movement." We will have a better sense of this greater church as we head off to Diocesan Council the 25th and 26th of this month.

Sometimes, it is easy to become a bit too inwardly focused. Let us keep in mind, what is God calling us to do in this little corner of His kingdom? What is God calling our vestry to do? What is He calling our school to do? What is He calling our children and youth to be doing? What is He calling for in the next rector, in terms of gifts and strengths? What has the pandemic cleared away for us and made more visible? How can we be better, loving neighbors with residents at The Court? How might each member of St. George's take on a bit more so that the same few who often lead don't have such heavy loads on their shoulders? We have some unfinished business around St. George's: some from years past and some of more recent arrival in the past year. During this time of transition is when we are trying to draw attention to and complete some of these checklist items. The reason for such work, now, is so that when the new rector arrives, the church all will not be loaded



with these projects to address; instead you and your hearts will be open and receptive to a new chapter in the Book of St. George's.

I remind you that Interim time is not just a place holder; but, it is time for the congregation to grieve their losses, start trying new ways, and begin looking at life on a new path, maybe even begin a new journey. An Interim Rector is called to help find the center; sort of a neutral place. When your new Rector comes there will be new energy, new thoughts and new ways of "doing church." Your new Rector needs your prayers now. Different priests are in prayer right now considering this congregation; and one of them will likely become your next Rector. Pray for them with all your hearts; just as they are praying for you.

Nineteen Steps to Calling a New Rector

Just as there are 19 steps in the Wright House up to the Rector's Office, there are 19 steps for the congregation going through the process of preparing for and calling a new rector. The whole congregation is invited to be part of the process of each of these 19 steps, the ultimate goal being the arrival of a newly called rector on Step 19! The steps are:



- 1. The Rector announces that s/he is leaving.
- Supply clergy lead worship; work out interim priest arrangement.
- ✓ 3. The Interim priest arrives; work out Interim Rector arrangement.
- ✓ 4. The Interim Rector arrives and begins transition work.
- \checkmark 5. The congregation completes a survey provided by the diocese.
- \checkmark 6. The results of the survey are shared with the congregation.
- 7. The Parish Profile Committee is formed and generates a Parish Profile.
- \checkmark 8. When the profile is ready, the diocese approves it.
- \checkmark 9. The Profile is circulated locally and nationally for six to eight weeks.
- ✓ 10. The Search Committee is formed and prepares for interviews.
- ✓ 11. The Search Committee reviews applications and holds interviews.
- ✓ 12. Zoom visits or (if safe and possible) in-person visits are held with the candidates.
- 13. The Search Committee narrows the list to one or two finalists and presents them to the Vestry.
- 14. Throughout the work of the Parish Profile and Search Committees, transition and interim work are taking place.
- 15. The Vestry reviews the name(s) from the Search Committee.
- 16. The Vestry votes to extend a call to one candidate.
- □ 17. A call goes out to the new Rector.

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- 18. A Transition Team is formed to welcome the new Rector and his/her family.
- 19. The new Rector arrives.







Women's Book Group


Wednesday Weavings

February celebrates BLACK HISTORY MONTH. There are many programs, readings, opportunities all scheduled during this month to celebrate the unique contributions that our Black brothers and sisters have made to our world. St. George's will set aside time on Sunday, February 13th to celebrate Absolum Jones (1746-1818), one of our early American saints who helped lead the church to more

Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday, which this year falls on Wednesday, March 2ndth, marks the beginning of the season of Lent, the period of forty days (excluding Sundays) leading up to Easter. St. George's will observe this day with a service at 7:00 pm. Lent is traditionally a time of self-examination and repentance through prayer, fasting, self-denial, and reading and meditating on scripture. The forty days of Lent symbolize the forty years in which the Israelites wandered in the wilderness in search of that you are dust you shall new practice, in order to deepen your faith and bring you closer to

Christ. We hope you will join us as the community of St. George's journeys together into the Lenten season.

Mikail "reads" for the GOEs

Ann+ suggested that some of you might enjoy hearing about my work with the national church in reading (evaluating) General Ordination Exams (GOEs) in February. These are the six written exams that candidates for ordination to the Episcopal Church from across the US and our territories take in early January each year. There are six "canonical" areas --(1) The Holy Scriptures, (2) History of the Christian Church, (3) Christian Theology, (4) Christian Ethics and Moral Theology, (5) Christian Worship, (6) The Practice of Ministry – which are given over three-four days (often with a break day in the middle). Most questions require a short response essay of 750-1200 words. The candidates are given the exams one by one and have 2-3 hours to answer each question set with only two question sets per day. The writers are given a code so that their responses are confidential and private.

A month later, a small group of potential readers are assigned to each area and must be trained and qualify to read. Generally, there are two teams of two qualified readers per question. This year a little over 168 candidates took the exam (not all dioceses require it) and that means that in addition to the exams I trained and qualified on in Church History, I will "read" another 81 essays on that set. I am given 9-14 days to do so; that is where I am currently. When I and my assigned partner finish our initial readings, our evaluations are compared. Anything we agree is a proficient answer is noted as such and is "done." Anything we disagree on must be resolved by us over another 5-6 days. Anything we agree that is not proficient must be carefully reviewed and we must write an analysis, of not less than 300 or more than 600 words, detailing what was done well and what was not sufficiently addressed, and provide guidance on how the candidate could have improved the response.

These analyzed answers and our response are sent to our "chaplain," often a bishop or a board reader with extensive experience, who oversee two sets of readers per area. If the chaplain does not agree with our analysis, it is sent back to us with the chaplain's concerns which must be addressed. When everything is approved, a final group of editors goes over

every reader response and makes sure the writing is consistent, fair, and follows the guidelines we were given. The exam and these analyses are put back together. Only then is a copy of our analysis sent to the candidate and his or her bishop and/or diocesan board of examining chaplains. So a "perfect" GOE is one with no written analysis. A GOE with one or two areas that are "NP" (not proficient) will initiate a more involved discussion with the bishop and/or the diocesan board of approval. The GOEs are just one of several evaluating tools used by bishops and their dioceses to ensure that the candidates are truly ready for ordination. While we read, we often engage in prayer, at least one community service (if only on Zoom these days), and prayerfully keep in mind that these folks are to be future leaders in our church.

I've done this "reading" for nearly 15 years on and off now. It has become more formalized and consistent over the years, especially more recently. It has also become more focused. Earlier we were given whole sets to evaluate, not just one area. That was harder (and the evaluations tended to be a bit more uneven), but it did give us a more concrete sense of the whole candidate. Now the candidate and bishop see the whole while we readers just see our "neck of the woods." Nonetheless, I do this each year because the P answers more often than not can be outstanding. And I learn a lot from them. And even those that get an NP for whatever reason often have sections or passages that give me immense hope for the future of the church. There are amazing folks coming up from our ordination process. And I am honored to be a part of that process, even if I only see a picture postcard part of it. Episcopal Church Structure 101

From Ann+:

A former Bishop that I served under, once said, "If you are having trouble sleeping, start reading The Episcopal Church Constitution and Canons!"

In preparation for our new rector, we are going to start this small column to help the congregation understand better some of the workings of the church as guided by the practices and rules of the larger Episcopal Church. This issue will deal with Canon III.9.6(a) **Rectors and Priests-in-Charge and Their Duties**.

(1) The Rector or Priest-in-Charge shall have full authority and responsibility for the conduct of the worship and the spiritual jurisdiction of the Parish, subject to the Rubrics of the Book

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of Common Prayer, the Constitution and Canons of the Church, and the pastoral direction of the Bishop.

(2). For the purposes of the office and for the full and free discharge of all functions and duties pertaining thereto, the Rector or Priest-in-Charge shall at all times be entitled to the use and control of the Church and Parish buildings together with all appurtenances and furniture, and to access to all records and registers maintained by or on behalf of the congregation.
