The Rector's Corner

Beginning Together, with Courage

For many reasons (some of which might be sort of subconscious) I've had courage on the mind/heart lately. In fact, I had a wonderful 12-mile run this morning from my little "temp home" to Town Lake (AKA Lady Bird Lake) via the Shoal Creek Greenbelt. I was mindful, on that run, that it takes a good deal of courage to set out on a 12-mile run. For some people, it takes unbelievable courage just to get out of bed in the morning. For us here at St. George's it will require great courage to face the challenges and opportunities before us.

Courage. It's the first of the seven cardinal virtues, in many ways. I call it the "baseline virtue." It's way simpler (note: not easier!) than the other three cardinal virtues of moderation, prudence, and justice. Historically, it is connected to the relatively straightforward life/work/vocation/task of a soldier on the battlefield in ancient Greece. The soldier's job is not to promote justice or to cultivate a prudential approach to some goal. No: his job is to stick to his post, to resist the temptation to abandon his post. It's not complicated: he either succeeds or fails.

Courage. Did you know that the church—the eucharistic community—is called to be a "school of virtue"? We have the great honor and privilege of forming one another in the ways of goodness and beauty. In the ways of courage, moderation, prudence, justice, faith, hope, and love.

And yet, as Augustine reminds us, the cultivation of virtue must be lubricated by the Gospel if it is to really "work," to really and truly bear fruit and promote shalom. "Aristotle's virtues," he thought, "are glittering vices." What does that mean? It means that without the grace of God, without the Holy Spirit, without the kind of humility that puts neighbor first, virtue can become a "clanging gong," as Paul teaches in 1 Cor 13.

So, you see, we do need courage. But not some kind of secular or worldly courage. The courage that we need must be oiled and greased with love, with grace, with the Gospel. Otherwise, those challenges I alluded to (but did not name)—homeless folks under IH-35, financial scarcity (real or perceived), ideological differences, personality turbulence, and much more—will eat our lunch. But guess what, dear friends of St. George's: Christ is really and truly with us. Christ is in our midst! I cannot wait to live into that truth/reality with you, starting, well, in about 48 hours from now as I write this blog!

Allow me to close this little piece like this: Eli and I have successfully moved in to our "temp home," thanks be to God. It is about a mile and a half west of the church, a 15-minute bike ride. Eli's first day of school in the magnet program at Lively Middle School was really and truly a blessing for him. Thanks be to God, again! As he and I have been discussing, our transition (which includes the physical absence of his big sister as well as the hole in our little home left by Bouquet, now back in Tyler, soon to visit again) is pretty much complete.

Now, the period of adjustment will begin. Begin, it has.

We are so thankful. Truly, "God did not give us a spirit of fear, but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind!" (2 Tim 1:7). Oh, and courage!




Wednesday Weavings



pretty amazing for a little church like ours.

OUTREACH Project One: Christopher House Bags

Delivery people needed! St. George's has a long-standing ministry of delivering hospitality baskets to the families of patients at Christopher House. As with everything else, the logistics of this have changed with the pandemic, but we continue to deliver baskets (except now they are bags with handles), and we need more delivery people! To be a part of this ministry, sign up for one or more weeks between



now and December on the bit.ly/CHbagsfromSGEC link. \$10 donation is requested per basket/bag (we currently do two bags a visit), and you can also add a note and other goodies (nothing perishable). You can make the donation online via the St. George's

under Outreach (look for the CH Basket tile), or by placing a check in the offertory basket (or mailing it to the church office) made out to "St. George's Episcopal Church," with "Christopher House Baskets" in the memo line. OUTREACH Project Two: SAFE Bags Project

Our friends at the SAFE Alliance have asked for us to do another round of our lovely handmade SAFE bags with lots of comfort items for their survivors of sexual assault. See the interview with Patsy Chandler (below) for why this work is so fulfilling as a ministry of St. George's. It takes three Sundays of effort (not including the work of those sewing bags from home or the gathering supplies) to make 200 or so handmade bags for our friends at SAFE:

1st **Sunday:** The **sew-in** will be after the 10:30 service for about 2-3 hours on **September 11** (**remember there are lots of tasks that do not require any special skills** – *many hands make light work*; and lunch is always provided; Father Matt will join us for this Sew-in!).

2nd Sunday: We will **fill the bags** during the Coffee Hour after the 10:30 service on **September 18th**. Again, lots of folks make this go quickly!

3rd Sunday: And the blessing, visit from our SAFE coordinators, and delivery will be part of the service on September 25th.

Off the Clock: Patsy Chandler Sews Bags to Provide Comfort, Compassion When she isn't working as an administrative assistant at Austin State Supported Living Center, Patsy Chandler is sewing comfort bags for families in the SAFE (Stop Abuse For Everyone) program. She has been sewing since

she was in her early teens. While she enjoys sewing a variety of items, including baby blankets and quilts for friends and co-workers, her top priority is giving back to SAFE families.

How did you start sewing?

My grandmother had an old Singer sewing machine that she taught me on. I just kept up with it over the years, especially in high school when a lot of us made our own clothes. I kept on making different things, sewing for my kids when they came along and for other people's babies.

Why did you start sewing comfort bags for SAFE? Our church has had a relationship with SAFE since 2015 or 2016. At first, we were gathering

toiletries that the patients would need. We really wanted to do something more personal than just going out, buying something and giving it to them.



We asked SAFE what else we could do. They said it would be nice if they had a basket or bag to put the items in. My friend Sarah and one of her friends sewed 27 bags and filled them with the items. SAFE was so impressed with them that when those 27 went out, which was quickly, they asked if we could do more.

It has grown over the last few years. We will pick a Sunday and have a sew-in after church. We bring our machines, scissors, yardsticks and whatever we need. When I first started participating in 2017, we were making maybe 40–50 bags each time. Since then, the need, unfortunately, has grown so much that we are making around 200 bags three times a year. A few of us will make 40–60 bags at home just to get us going. During the sew-in, we can make maybe 65–70 bags. The Sunday after the sew-in, we'll have an assembly line where we fill the bags with the comfort items. The Sunday after that, we'll have a blessing for the bags with members from SAFE in attendance. The bags are then loaded in cars for transport to their office.

This ministry is so needed. We get wonderful thank-you notes from the SAFE staff and the patients saying how appreciative they are that someone who doesn't even know them would do this. It is a very difficult time in a person's life which makes us want to do more for them. We're sorry this ministry is needed, but we are so thankful that, even in our small parish, we have the community of families that want to participate. People who don't sew will come in and string the ribbon through the bags, iron them or make lunch for us. The children are runners, taking things from one station to the next.

What's your favorite thing to sew?

I love making the SAFE bags, but also love making baby blankets and quilts. I've always liked babies and did a lot of babysitting when I was younger, including volunteer work in a newborn nursery in my 20s. I did foster care for infants from 1980–1990. During that time, our family had around 85 newborn babies begin their life with us. I just love new life coming into the world and being able to give them something I've created. I also sew for Threads of Love, which is a ministry for neonatal intensive care unit babies.

Why do you continue to sew and make comfort bags for SAFE?

I've been very blessed in my life, not necessarily with material things, but with people and friends that care for me. I've known people who have been in the same situation as the SAFE patients. Knowing that I can do something for them that can make them feel better at that time is my motivation. You've probably heard the expression, "Blessed to be a Blessing." That's how I feel about this. I still enjoy sewing all kinds of other things, but this is the most meaningful thing I do — being a part of something that's a great deal bigger than me and giving some encouragement and comfort to the people who are affected by sexual or domestic violence.

News from the School

The school year is off to a great start. We are completely staffed up - - -

Hallelujah! Now comes the real work of training and establishing the continuity the school is known for. Please pray for us as we work with so many new staff members that everyone receives the positive guidance and training with an open heart and open mind. I am confident that this is the year we can regain our footing and proceed with our mission of being an inclusive community, inspiring children to

love learning by nurturing each child's mind, body, and spirit.

I am also excited and look forward to working with Father Matt. My meeting with him back in June was inspiring and I can't wait to see what the church and school can accomplish together.

A Surprise Visitor – A Turkey Vulture

The turkey vulture uses its sense of smell to locate carrion. Its heightened ability to detect odors allows it to find dead animals below a forest canopy. The Turkey Vulture maintains stability and lift at low altitudes by holding its wings up in a slight V-shape and teetering from side to side while flying. It flies low to the ground to pick up the scent of dead animals. The turkey vulture's stomach acid is extremely acidic, so they can digest just about anything. By taking care of the carrion, vultures provide an essential service for the health of our ecosystems. Without them, carcasses would accumulate, and diseases would spread from rotting flesh.

This turkey vulture came seeking chicken quarters, tossed in the culvert for the feral cats. I frightened him away when I saw Mama Kitty stalking him, fearless against this bird, three times her size!
