Deacon's Corner

Dear St. George's Family:

I am writing this column on a rainy day in November as truck crews from TXDOT clear out the areas underneath I-35 inhabited by our homeless neighbors. I am saddened by this policy. If the City of Austin cannot provide affordable permanent housing for everyone, I believe the least we can do is allow the homeless to camp on public property in areas unused by the public. I have watched over this past year as our homeless neighbors underneath I-35 have created clean campsites and lived peacefully with us, and I regard them as good neighbors. I have developed relationships with many of them and, on behalf of St. George's, given them tents, sleeping bags, clothing, food, and a variety of small items. The donations I have received from the parishioners of St. George's have made this generosity possible. In return, our homeless neighbors have responded with gratitude and kindness, and I feel privileged to serve them.



When we talk about faith, sometimes we refer to the doctrines of the Church: what we believe. While that is important to me, I believe that faith is also about what we do. As we know from the Letter of James, "For just as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is also dead" (James 2:26). If all we do is wish our neighbor peace and love, I believe we are not fully living out the Gospel. As Jesus said in the Sermon on the Mount, "Every good tree bears good fruit" (Matthew 7:17). At St. George's, I know we are committed to acting on our faith and will continue doing so. To me, serving our homeless neighbors underneath the highway is part of that faith. I thank you for supporting me in this ministry, and I welcome you to join me in any way to which you feel called.

The Season of Advent



The first Sunday of Advent, which falls on December 1st this year, begins the Church's liturgical year. Advent begins four Sundays before Christmas and lasts until Christmas Eve. It is a time of reflection, waiting and preparation for the birth of Jesus Christ. The season's name is derived from the Latin word *adventus*, which means "coming" or "arrival." Advent is a time of preparation and expectation for the coming celebration of our Lord's nativity, and for the final coming of Christ. The Scripture readings throughout the season reflect this double anticipation of the coming of Christ – his First Advent as a babe in Bethlehem, and his Second Advent in power and glory. Advent is a reminder that we live between the times, when what has been promised has not yet been fulfilled. Advent is also an invitation into a space of prayerful expectation that is often at odds with the larger culture's approach to the weeks before Christmas.

The most common symbol of Advent is the Advent Wreath – a circle of greenery with four (or five) candles, each of which represents one of the Sundays of the season. (If a fifth candle is used, it is placed in the center and called the Christ Candle, and it is lit on Christmas Eve.) Each Sunday, the circle of light expands, as Christ comes ever closer.

Please do not purchase phone cards yourself, as Casa Marianella can get a better rate by purchasing a large number at once.

Poinsettias

Be sure to turn in your form by **Sunday, December 15th** to have your name and dedication listed in the bulletin.

The suggested donation is **\$20 per plant**. Make checks payable to St. George's (with "Poinsettias" noted in the memo line), or donate online by clicking the DONATE button at www.sgchurch.org and indicating the amount of your gift in the appropriate section (*Designated Gifts, Altar Guild, write "Poinsettias" in the notes section*).

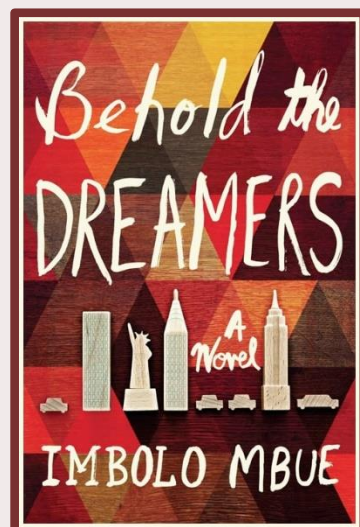
Women's Book Group Holiday Tea

Water Line Break / Request for Donations

On December 1st, a water line going under the patio outside the south entrance to the church broke and began leaking a significant amount of water into the ground and into the church basement. Repairing the leak will require breaking up some of the concrete in the patio to access the pipes underneath. We are working to minimize the disruption to the church and particularly the school, which cannot operate without running water. More details will be forthcoming, as we learn more about the situation.



Donations of clothing for our homeless neighbors are stored in the church basement, and after the leak, our Deacon Jim Enelow discovered that quite a bit of clothing had been saturated and ruined. So he is once again in need of donations of winter clothing to give to our neighbors. If you have anything that you no longer need, please consider donating it.

St. George's Organ

You may have noticed the organ in the church doesn't always sound quite right. Our Music Minister, Mi-Young Kim, does her best but is handicapped by an organ that is gradually failing. It's been tuned and had a few minor problems fixed, but its condition can only be described as dire. A full repair of the organ is estimated to cost over \$100,000, and, even if we could repair it, expensive regular maintenance would be required.



Several members of the church, particularly Brian Wolfe, our resident organ expert, have been looking at alternatives for several years. Recently, Brian learned of a computerized organ system (NOT an electric organ) – the Hauptwerk virtual pipe organ – which he has suggested we consider. The system includes an actual organ console with pedals, a computer and software inside, and studio-quality speakers. A few members of St. George's have heard the system and it sounds astonishingly like the real thing. Most critically, it is significantly less expensive than renovating the existing organ and would also free up space where the existing organ is. Here's a [video of a Hauptwerk organ](#) being played.

We would like to hear feedback from the parish regarding what you think of the idea of replacing the existing organ with a computerized, digital organ. To that end, John Rickard will be available after the 10:30 service most weeks through Advent and is able to answer questions. The idea is to collect reactions from the congregation and present them to the Vestry so they can decide whether to move forward with replacing the organ. Annual Parish Meeting

Recycling

Please be aware that recycling at St. George's is somewhat different from residential recycling. Unfortunately, we can NOT recycle **glass** here. The large recycling bin in the parking lot also can NOT take any kind of **plastic bag**, or anything contaminated with **food waste** (even if it would otherwise be recyclable).

Waste Management, the company that handles our trash and recycling, has let us know that our recycling has often been contaminated with non-recyclable material in recent months, and we are charged an additional fee when that is the case. Thank you for your help!
