

Letter from the Rector

Advent, Good Friday, & Judgement

Advent is complicated.

Fifteen years into ordained ministry as an Episcopal priest, I admit that, over the past fifteen Advents, I've attempted (a little bit, anyway) to "skimp." I have given Advent "short shrift," lacking the time (so I felt) to really delve into it deeply, figuring out for myself what I think it all means.

This year, I have tried to repent. In fact I have re-preached my last two sermons (the last two of November), relying much on previous years' sermons, in order precisely to give myself more time to prepare for Advent.

And yet, I realize now more than ever: Advent—its theological meaning—is complicated!

Take, for example, this Sunday's Gospel lesson from Mark 13, commonly called the "Olivet Discourse." This little vignette is almost impossible to wrap our heads around. When Jesus speaks of "the Son of Man coming in the clouds" and of heaven and earth passing away, is he predicting the second coming that we confess regularly in the Creed? If so, why on earth would he say, "This generation will not pass away before these things take place."? (Mark 13:30) Was Jesus just confused?

I think not ... but more on that later!

For now, I want to recommend a book written by one of the first women ordained to the priesthood in the Episcopal Church, Fleming Rutledge: Advent: the Once and Future Coming of Jesus Christ. I encourage everyone to buy this book; you can watch an author summary of it here.

One of the themes of the book is a topic that many of us would rather avoid: the theme of judgment.

This reminds me, at a deep instinctual level, of another time during the church year: Good Friday.

What I mean is this. I will never forget the feeling I had during my first Good Friday service. You see, for at least three decades now, I have been a "recovering fundamentalist." In other words, I have been trying to shed those elements of my Christian upbringing that are destructive, or irrational, or based more in bizarre idiosyncrasies of twentieth-century American culture than they are in scripture, reason, and/or tradition.

But as a recovering fundamentalist, it's sometimes difficult to shed the suspicion of those "liberals" in those "mainline Protestant denominations." After all, I was told (during my childhood), they don't have any theological convictions. They don't actually embrace the difficult dimensions of the Gospel. They are simply "blown and tossed by the wind" of the secular culture that surrounds us.

This bias (admittedly directed toward "typical Episcopalians") was difficult for me to overcome. It seemed plausible to me. Until. Until I attended my first Good Friday service in an Episcopal Church. Never had I seen the embrace of such deep, dark suffering. Never had I experienced such penitent sorrow over sin. Never had I seen such openness to judgment, the judgment of God.

From then on, I realized the deep truth of our church: we don't talk about judgment ("hell, fire, and brimstone") all the time ... but we do focus on it at the appropriate time. (Similar wisdom applies to the topic of money and "tithing.")

How wonderful. How wise. I wonder, though: starting this year, could we make Advent a little more like Good Friday?

This year, we will explore God's judgment. I hope you will join us!





St. George's Episcopal School

As you all know, schools are a busy place with so much going on behind the scenes. With the responsibility of not just the health and safety of the children, but also providing a solid foundation for children's future academic success, along with the human resource component and financial responsibilities, it can be easy to feel a bit overwhelmed. Thankfully though, I inherited a great strategy when arriving here at St. George's - - A Strategic Plan. Each year I create action items in six areas of this plan, and then update the plan quarterly with the school board. At the recent school board meeting, it was suggested that I share the goals from the plan with others invested in the health of our school. The six strategic areas are as follows:

- 1) Strategic Area: Growth
 - Goal: Promote and manage the growth of the school responsibly and in concert with church growth plans.
- 2) Strategic Area: Faculty and Staff
 - Goal: Establish an academic staff that is highly qualified and appropriately compensated.
- 3) Strategic Area: Facilities
 - Goal: Have a safe and attractive environment that fosters a love of learning.
- 4) Strategic Area: Program & Curricula
 - Goal: Develop and implement an educational program that creates an environment fostering exploration and love of learning, which balances social and emotional development and recognizes the individual needs of each child.
- 5) Strategic Area: Governance and Leadership
 - Goal: Support and enhance the governance and leadership of the school.



- 6) Strategic Area: Finance
 - Goal: Stabilize and professionalize our school and its financial procedures.

Within this well-thought-out plan, my action items have four objectives 1) assign the tasks to responsible parties (school's administrative staff and school board members), 2) develop a metric for success, 3) schedule a due date, and 4) provide quarterly updates. I'm happy to report that the quarterly update to the school board was met with favoritism. We are on the right track for the continued success of our school.
