Incoming Rector's Corner: An Invitation to Being Human Together

Looking back at various points and in various seasons of my life, there have been times when I have thought and said (out loud, even!) that the only thing I believe in is the Body of Christ, that is, the Church. (Of course, the church is not primarily an "institution"; it is primarily a community.) I suppose it's kind of an extreme statement, but I hope it communicates something of my theology, and how I see the world. For me the community of Christ--the eucharistic community--is everything. All else grows out of, flows out from, the love between these sisters, brothers, and friends. Put it this way: if Christ is real, and if the Gospel is true, then being Christian ought to make us more fully human. ("The glory of God is the human being, fully alive," said St. Irenaeus.)

I experienced this truth in my early 30's as a church planter in the St. John's Community in Northeast Austin, where the eucharistic community consisted of Latino folks (many of whom were undocumented) "doing life" with white, upwardly mobile tech industry types. I experienced it for the last twelve years at Christ Church in Tyler, where "establishment" Episcopalians embraced and celebrated newer younger (less affluent) families who previously could not even spell "Episcopalian." And, now, finally, I am truly beginning to experience it in the context of St. George's in East Central Austin.

I'd like to share three ways in which St. George's is already making me (and the family) more fully human: embrace, home, and rest.

First, embrace (being desired). I'm convinced that the deepest need of every human heart is to be fully known and fully loved/accepted. That is, each one of us needs to feel desired. (This need is closely related to what Plato calls thumos, and it's a central theme in C. S. Lewis' The Weight of Glory.) Lucky for me: the beautiful folks on the St. George's search committee and vestry have made me feel just that: desired. I'm head over heels about coming to St. George's (or, to quote Father Gregory Boyd of Homeboy Industries in Los Angeles, "heels over head").

Second, home (being connected). In more ways than one, St. George's (already) feels like home. My wife Bouquet has a keen and mysterious mystical sense, and long before we moved to Tyler she had some kind of a strange, ineffable attraction to St. George's. So, when this opportunity emerged for me to be a candidate for the rector position, in Bouquet's mind it was from the beginning a "done deal." (Very, very mysterious.) But beyond that, I remember wandering into St. George's on a Sunday morning (circa 2007, just after leaving my more conservative, evangelical denomination) and hearing a David Hoster sermon on Genesis 32 (Jacob wrestling with the "angel") which moved me profoundly and irrevocably. These are just two ways (among many) that St. George's, for the Boulters, feels like home, like coming home. (And, yes: being home makes us more human.)

Third, rest (being at peace). Two things spring to mind here. First is the myriad of ways in which the Boulters will breathe a deep sigh of relief upon getting back to Austin. Everything from my fourteen-year-old being in a more trans-friendly environment to being able to return to my favorite old running trails. As my best friend (and Austin "Eastsider") Richard

Yu put it just the other day: "You guys will be able to breathe more easily once you get back."

Yet, there's another dimension of rest I want to draw out, and it's this: I have a strong hunch that the people of St. Georges' are in need of ... rest. Thanks to COVID, thanks to being rector less for a good while, thanks to various and sundry other challenges ... the folks of this parish, and especially the valiant leadership, need to rest.

God willing, rest is coming. That's a top priority of mine, for you. (Please, God!) We have tons of good and ample hard work in front of us, yes. But all in due time. There can also be a time and a place for recovery, for rejuvenation. Letting the fields lie fallow for a season. Many have sacrificed, and my prayer is that I can lighten their load.

"Come unto me, all who are weary," Jesus tells us, "and I will give you rest."



A Vigil in Response to Buffalo and Uvalde



Thursday, June 2nd, 2022

Our Bridgette Beineke alerted us that the Mueller Community was hosting a vigil for the victims of the mass shootings in Buffalo, NY and Uvalde, TX.

the SGEC parish showed up
for a surprisingly pleasant

walk the evening of June 2nd around the Mueller Lake to the bandstand, one of the last cool nights before summer began in earnest this year.

The evening ended with a very sobering but meaningful holding of pictures and calling out of the names to honor the lives lost.

Two speakers – one from Uvalde and another speaking for the victims in Buffalo -- reminded us that "thoughts and prayers" while a good start, are not sufficient, and that we need to find ways to put thoughts into actions to end this national affliction of gun violence on innocent people.




The evening ended with a lone trumpeter, who played "Taps" as dusk fell.

We share a simple meal, discuss a selected reading for the evening, and close with a brief Compline service. We are currently reading from *The Way of Love*, a Forward Movement publication edited by Marek Zabriskie, which offers fifty meditations, each consisting of a Scripture reading, reflection, discussion questions, and prayer. The meditations are divided into seven sections based on seven spiritual practices for a Jesus-centered life.

Christopher House Bags



OUTREACH UPDATE from Sarah and Alice

SAFE Comfort Bags

The next SAFE delivery is scheduled for **September**: **Sew-in** on the **11**th, **filling** on the **18**th and **blessing and visit from SAFE** on the **25**th. Meanwhile, we have receive loving and appreciative comments from the survivors we serve as reported by the SAFE Advocates:

- They loved it, especially the card and lavender sachet. They said, "Please tell them thank you."
- ❖ The survivor said they loved it and read the card, felt really thankful.
- ❖ They were amazed to learn that the bags are handmade.
- They loved it and expressed thanks for the support.
- They enjoyed going through it and really utilized the stress ball through the whole exam.
- They were so excited to receive it and repeatedly went through it. When they had a trauma response, they took at the lavender bag and took a few deep breaths with it up to their nose. They even wrote down St. George's name, I think as a reminder to thank them later.
- The survivor was so excited about the lavender sachet! They said that they were going to put it into their pillow tonight. They also commented on how cute the bag was and wanted to learn how to make them themselves. They loved it!

These lovely sentiments are just reminders of how meaningful this work is, and how blessed we are to work with SAFE.

Holiday Outreach Plans:

Tentative plans are to work with El Buen Samaritano for Thanksgiving food donations, and to have our tree with gift cards for St. George's Court and Casa Marianella at Christmas. We hope Carolyn Moreau will continue as EBS coordinator and that this year we will be able to have an in-person presentation. Andrea has agreed to coordinate Christmas Outreach again this year. Thank you both!

Other Outreach Plans:

We hope to return to our old practice of getting together in a "mini-retreat" for 2 hours or so to discuss outreach programs that are meaningful and contribute to our mission. We won't schedule this meeting until our new rector is with us, but **mid-October seems likely**. It will be a good time to look around and see where we think we are needed. We hope to announce a date by mid-September.
