


Letter from the Rector

Dependence Day 2023

By now, many of you have, no doubt, heard snippets of Bouquet's story about how her family came to this country in 1980 (when Bouquet was five years old), how they fled communist bullets, how they lived in a refugee camp in Thailand for about a year, finally to be sponsored for United States citizenship by the First Baptist Church of San Antonio.

One story she likes to tell is how her father, after having lived in the U. S. as a political refugee turned U. S. citizen for many years, began to say, "I want to visit my nation's capital." Bouquet assumed he was speaking about Vientiane, Laos, so she began planning an overseas trip. "Then we go to Philadelphia, see Liberty Bell," my father-in-law said with his Asian-accented, broken English. Bouquet realized that the capital of "his nation" was not Vientiane but rather Washington, D. C. His felt sense of citizenship had changed, and so had his patriotism.

Now, Bouquet makes me a better person (a better human, a better Christian) in countless ways, but one of them has to do with patriotism. You see, I often feel a deep sense of antipathy toward my home country, the United States of America. I lament our unjust past; I grieve the ways that past still haunts us and the ways we deny its reality; I detest attempts to cloak the Gospel or the Church in the American flag as if Christianity is an American thing, as if America is a Christian nation in any straightforward sense. In fact, one of the reasons I was drawn to become the rector of St. George's is that I knew that I'd be under no pressure to lead a "patriotic Sunday" on or near July 4, the pressure I have struggled with in the past. For this, I am truly grateful, and for this reason, last Sunday (July 2) was one of my favorite Sundays so far at St. George's.

And yet, how easy it is to go to extremes! To be so obsessed with your own perspective that your tongue becomes the servant of your ego. When it comes to speaking about the relationship between Gospel and America, I have, at times in the past, failed to be guided by humility and love.

How wonderful it is, then, to have a wife (a partner, a teammate, a best friend) who sees things differently! Who reminds me of the other side of the coin: that this nation truly has been a beacon of hope and freedom for so many. This kind of balance is what marriage and the church are all about. We need each other.

"We need each other." In other words, we depend on each other.

Dependence. That is what July 4 has come to mean for me. It is a reminder that, without Bouquet's perspective, I am a fool. Not that we can't have honest disagreements: to the contrary! And yet, I am enriched when I put myself in her shoes and remember and embrace her experience and perspective. For that kind of wisdom, I am dependent on her. As for any good marriage, so also for the church.

Finally, as much as we need and depend on each other, how much more are we dependent on Christ! At the end of the day, those are the same thing.

Happy Dependence Day, 2023!

A huge thanks to all the workers and carers of St. George's who made this recent gift of 200 comfort bags happen once again. We were thrilled to welcome our new coordinator Sabina Ibarrola and her colleagues, Jennifer and Satchi, to the service on July 18. We were moved by their heartfelt testimony about how much the bags matter to the survivors. The profound witness about the program in Father Matt's sermon made the morning even more meaningful.

Sabina continues to provide us with responses from the recipients of these bags. The few comments chosen for inclusion below are a sample of a large number of comments of appreciation:

- The survivor commented on the comfort bag, helping her feel warm and secure.
- This survivor was very angry and unhappy about the process and experience at the hospital. Receiving the comfort bag was very powerful for her and, in her words, "turned this day around."
- The survivor LOVED their comfort bag. They said that they were working through dissociative tendencies in therapy, and they took out the lavender sachet and stress ball and used them both during the interview. They organized the M&Ms by color and ate them during the interview as well all of those tools were super helpful and deeply appreciated by this neurodivergent survivor.
- She loved the comfort bag. She thought it was very pretty and loved that it was blessed by the church.
