Rector's Corner

Dear St. George's Family:

Over the past several weeks, we have experienced unprecedented times for our world and in the life of our church community. I have been amazed by the resiliency of the St. George's community. It is a source of hope and joy to see the community as strong as ever during these trying times.

This past week Bishop Andy Doyle shared his vision for the future opening of diocesan institutions. In previous directives, the Bishop had indicated that churches could re-open as of May 11th, but in light of more recent information, he has opted to use a more phased approach. It is apparent that the virus is not going away any time soon. The phased approach that the diocesan staff are planning will ensure the safest outcomes for each member of our community.

This approach includes four phases as we work towards returning to the communal life of the church. We are currently in Phase I, which focuses on slowing the spread of the virus. Phase II will be initiated after the stay-at-home and work-safe protocols have been lifted, and will continue the prohibition on large group gatherings. Phase III will welcome the return to regular public life. Phase IV will involve the work of preparing for future pandemics. Moving from one phase to the next, including beginning in-person worship and church-sponsored gatherings of all kinds, at the church or in members' homes, will require the guidance and approval of our Regional Bishop, the Right Reverend Kai Ryan.

Determining the dates when we will transition between these phases is difficult; we will work with the diocese to make appropriate decisions. In the weeks to come, St. George's staff and vestry will determine how to proceed with clarity. I personally do not see us entering into Phase II until, at the earliest, early June. We will not be able to enter Phase II until at least 14 days of continuous reduction in community spread occurs. And it is important to note that not every church will transition from one phase to the next at the same time. The right time for one location may not be the best for another.

One of the great benefits of this experience has been the introduction of virtual worship to our community. Even after we begin public in-person worship again, we will continue to offer virtual worship, enabling those who might have difficulty getting to church to continue worshipping with us.

I believe the directives given to our parishes by the bishop are of paramount importance. They are provided for our mutual well-being, and the continuation of the Kingdom of God. We have a daunting task ahead of us as we work toward the return to regular public life, but I believe through the ingenuity, creativity, and love of the members of our great community, we will come away with a renewed understanding of mission within the kingdom.

Over the next few weeks your rector, staff, and vestry will continue to share developments concerning our future. It continues to be my pleasure to serve the Kingdom of God alongside you. I know that we will do likewise, as we live through this modern-day exile from our church community and so many of those we love.


Letter from the Senior Warden





Wednesday Weavings





Pentecost



~ Acts 2:2-3

The Day of Pentecost recalls the coming of the Holy Spirit to the first disciples of Jesus, empowering them to preach the gospel to people from many different places, backgrounds, and cultures. The disciples who had formerly been confused and frightened after the Ascension of Jesus, not knowing what to do without his physical presence among them, were emboldened by the Spirit, and began to

form a community that would be able to carry on in these new circumstances. Pentecost is sometimes called the birthday of the Church for this reason. As the contemporary embodiment of the community those first disciples began, we celebrate the fruits of the Spirit in each of us and the sharing of our gifts with our community and the world.

Join us <u>online</u> on the Day of Pentecost, Sunday, May 31st, as we celebrate the presence of the Holy Spirit among us. We will join together in reading the gospel in languages from around the globe. It is traditional to **wear red** on Pentecost – even if you're at home! – so that the congregation itself becomes a symbol of the flames of the Holy Spirit.

Christopher House Basket Deliveries

St. George's has a long-standing ministry of delivering hospitality baskets to the families of patients at Christopher House, who are in their final illness. The baskets contain necessities and also items to help pass the time. The families have often been summoned with little notice or time for preparation, so the baskets provide a useful gesture of support. Of course, the current situation has affected Christopher House and



how it can interact with families and with volunteers like those who deliver baskets. Shelter-in-place rules have limited them to six patients at a time and only one visiting family member per patient. For now Philip, their Volunteer Coordinator, requests that St. George's delivers only one basket per week, rather than our usual two, and has some new instructions for us:

- If you already have two baskets for delivery, please just deliver one during the week you're scheduled, and save the other one for another time.
- Please don't put any perishable items in the baskets as demand will be uneven for now, and baskets may need to be held for a while before being given to a visiting family member.
- When you make a delivery, park in back of the building. You may need to ring the bell to get admitted to the courtyard. Someone will meet you at the back door and take delivery of your basket.

Philip was extremely appreciative of this long-running outreach project and spoke warmly about how each item in the basket is valued. COVID-19 Testing



Austin Public Health has launched an online Enrollment Form for COVID-19 testing, available at **AustinTexas.gov/COVID19**. The online form will allow people to take an assessment to determine eligibility and schedule testing without a referral from a healthcare provider. To access the form, click

on the "Take Self-Assessment" button to create an account and complete a questionnaire listing your symptoms. If you meet the criteria you will be referred to testing. Completion of the online assessment does not guarantee referral to testing. Austin Public Health will continue to prioritize healthcare workers, first responders, and people at higher risk for developing severe symptoms. Testing continues to be by appointment-only and tests at the APH testing sites are FREE.

SAFE Alliance

The week of April 19-25 was Volunteer Appreciation Week, and we are thrilled that the SAFE Alliance has chosen St. George's and our Comfort Bag project as the volunteer group they are highlighting! You can see their touching tributes to our work and some photos on their <u>Facebook post</u> and <u>Twitter post</u>. Here's what they said:

The congregation of St. George's Episcopal Church has been supporting survivors of sexual assault who come through SAFE's Eloise House since 2014. Every single patient who

receives services from our sexual assault program is where hope a healing begin offered at least two things: an information packet with our hotline and resources, and a hand-sewn comfort bag from the people at St. George's.



Through the years, St. George's has graciously donated nearly 600 bags a year and given survivors this gift that demonstrates they are believed and supported even when they leave the gates of SAFE. Each bag contains a stress toy, a small satchel of lavender to help comfort and calm, some candy, a comb, a toothbrush, and a hand-written note of affirmation from a member of the congregation. Each bag has a unique pattern, giving survivors the opportunity to pick their favorite style. Survivors are often moved to tears when they receive their bags. The comfort bags help advocates to form a closer bond, teach adaptive coping and self-soothing activities with the stress management tools they contain, and shows the survivor that the community supports them.

Before bringing the bags to SAFE, St. George's opens up their church and welcomes our advocates to join them for a bag blessing. Everyone who helped create the bags puts a hand on them as a prayer is said. The generosity of love and resources given by St. George's is an essential part of our program and our community.

Because the comfort bags have demonstrated the sewing prowess of St. George's members, the SAFE Alliance has asked if we can help them with making masks for the survivors they serve. Some people have already started on this project, but they can always use more! If you have the ability and time to sew masks, please contact Sarah Campbell at cowmarket2@gmail.com for more details.

Seminary Commencement

The Seminary of the Southwest has made the decision that this year's commencement ceremony will be held online. The ceremony will recognize and celebrate graduating students and award degrees in divinity, religion, counseling, chaplaincy, pastoral care, and spiritual formation, and diplomas in Anglican studies and in theological studies. The ceremony will be held on Wednesday, May 20th, at 10:00 am, and live-

streamed via the **Seminary of the Southwest website**. Our current seminarian Bryan Callen and former seminarian Nelson Mendoza will be among the graduates.

Foundation Communities

Foundation Communities has been supporting many of our residents with emergency rent, food, and supplies during this time. Our residents are really resilient in adjusting to life and school and work at home, and at this moment we are not aware of anyone that is still in quarantine. Our Prosper Centers are still

Casa Marianella is currently doing well. All 14 shelter houses are full and no one is sick currently. Precautions are working so far. Our biggest challenge currently is that many of our former residents have lost their jobs. We are providing food and



rental assistance for as many as 60 or more households for May 1. Although Casa's volunteer program is currently not active, we do have people who are helping deliver food to people in quarantine. We are particularly grateful for the generosity of St. George's and to a number of St. George's members who have helped financially in this challenging time.
