Daylight Savings Ends

It finally feels like fall, which means that Daylight Savings Time is coming to an end! Early on the morning of **Sunday, November 1**st (or on the evening of **Saturday, October 31**st), remember to **FALL BACK** and set your clocks back one hour. Showing up an hour early to online church may be less embarrassing than doing it in person, but you'll still be annoyed with yourself for missing out on that extra hour of sleep!

All Saints' Day / Día de los Muertos



Rituals around the certainty of death and the care of the dead are universal. The many Christian traditions around the observation of All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day are related to other customs of veneration for one's ancestors practiced worldwide, through events such as the Roman custom of the Lemuria, the Celtic Samhain, the Chinese Ghost Festival, and the Japanese Bon Festival.

All Saints' Day – November 1st, but often celebrated the following Sunday – is the day the Church honors all Holy Ones, known and unknown. Our English word "saint" literally means "holy." In the broad sense, all we who are baptized are included in this category, but from the beginning of the Christian tradition, certain of the faithful whose lives were exemplary have been held before us as

our models and guides. While we have information about many Saints, and we honor them on specific days, there are many unknown or unsung Saints, whom we celebrate on All Saints' Day. The Commemoration of All Faithful Departed, more commonly known as All Souls' Day, falls on November 2nd. This day is set aside to remember those who have died to whom we have a more personal connection – not necessarily those whose lives are held up as models for all Christians, but those whose lives, and deaths, have personally affected us.


Día de los Muertos, the traditional Mexican celebration of these two days, can actually be traced further back than the arrival of Christianity in Mexico. The Aztecs celebrated a festival for the goddess of the underworld, Mictecacihuatl, and many indigenous cultures of Mexico honor the Lady of the Dead, sometimes portrayed today as La Catrina, a skeleton woman wearing a fancy hat. When the Spanish arrived in Mexico, bringing Catholicism with them,

the traditional Mexican celebrations of Mictecacihuatl and the Lady of the Dead, through which ancestors were honored, merged with the Catholic observances of All Saints' and All Souls' Days. Celebrations often feature altars honoring those who have died with marigolds, sugar skulls, favorite foods or beverages, and other mementos of the dead. Families often visit the gravesites of deceased family members, where they bring offerings, or ofrendas, hold vigils, and even have picnics and parades as a way of celebrating the life of those who have gone on before them.



These celebrations of All Saints', All Souls', and Día de los Muertos are tied in with the belief in the Communion of Saints, that all of God's people, in this earthly life and in the various states of the larger life, are connected in one communion. The Saints are not divine, nor omnipresent or omniscient. However, because of our common communion with and through Jesus Christ, our prayers are joined with the heavenly community of Christians. At St. George's, as at many other churches, we observe this sacred time with a special altar, which Denise Hope and Mark Cassstevens have volunteered to decorate again this year despite the restrictions related to COVID-19. The service on **Sunday, November 1**st will include a reading of the names of those who have died since the All Saints' Day last year, as well as a slideshow of photos of loved ones who have died, since such photos cannot be placed on the Día de los Muertos altar this year. Please join us on All Saints' Day as we remember those who have gone before us.

Compline Services



St. George's is carefully restarting in-person gatherings with outdoor Sunday evening Compline services at 5:15 pm. Compline is a beautiful evening prayer service, which will be led by our new Interim Priest Merrill Wade. The services are limited to approximately 20 people and require registration. To attend, please register online.

Compline will last approximately 15-20 minutes and will be held at the rear of the playground. If you wish to sit,

please bring your own chair; you are also welcome to stand. Masks and social distancing will be required, and bathrooms will not be available. Please bring a Book of Common Prayer or a device to access **Compline online**. We look forward to seeing you in person!




Wednesday Weavings

News from the School

I am pleased to announce that we are still managing without any cases of Covid. I always hesitate stating that because I'm aware of the possibilities, but I am also aware of how staff and parents are staying vigilant and following the protocols. Thank you all for this!!

Due to our success, the school is receiving calls from currently enrolled families about extending days of the week, as well as calls for new family enrollment. Therefore, I am hiring new staff in preparation for opening another class in January. This will be a class of young toddlers. I do not have plans to open any more classes during this school year. The school is able to cover expenses without much left over, however by opening a seventh classroom, we will have a little extra to begin the process of replenishing the money used to cover salaries during the shutdown. Even with the help of the Payroll Protection Program, the school had to use a large sum of their reserves to cover expenses as families slowly began to come back.

All funds raised will help the school continue to provide exceptional care and education by rebuilding our reserves. Your donations will help many more enjoy our magnificent playgrounds and strong curriculum which launches them into a bright educational future.
- 5. And thanks to the PTF for a successful Photo Fundraising event! We raised \$2,550 from sitting fees alone, and when prints are purchased, we will receive an additional 50%.
